Welcome to the Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay, Georgia

Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay, Georgia, is the Atlantic Fleet's strategic submarine base. The base supports the Navy's Submarine-Launched, Ballistic-Missile Program and is one of two bases capable of providing logistics for the Trident II (D-5) Missile.

In addition to being an integral part of our nation's strategic deterrent program, Kings Bay is recognized for total commitment to innovation, quality of life, environmental awareness and community relations. We are glad you can join us!

Base History



When Kings Bay became a Naval Support Base on July 1, 1978, there were only a few buildings here. The base administration building is in the upper left corner. The Navy Exchange is the white building in the center.

The Early Years

The Kings Bay region is a pleasant place to live, as is shown by the fact that people have populated the area for thousands of years. Archeological research has revealed a pre-Columbian Indian presence throughout the area.

Early in the 19th century, much of what is now a bustling modern submarine base was the site of several plantations. Along the bay, Thomas King developed his Kings Bay plantation. Buying the land in the 1790s, King built what today is classified as a small-to-medium plantation. Investigations by University of Florida archaeologists

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revealed a broad spectrum of previously unknown information about the lifestyle of the typical small-to-medium farmer of the day.

Elsewhere on the base, John Houston McIntosh built a considerably larger plantation known as New Canaan, where he grew cotton and sugar cane.

The plantation system declined after the Civil War, and the land was separated into smaller holdings. Residents harvested abundant fish and other seafood, and trapped and hunted to supplement small-scale farming of corn, rice, sugar and other vegetables.

The Army Years

The Army began to acquire land at Kings Bay in 1954 to build a military ocean terminal that would be used to ship ammunition in case of a national emergency. Construction actively began in 1956 and was completed in 1958. Since there was no immediate operational need for the installation, however, it was placed in an inactive ready status.

The most prominent feature of the terminal was its 2,000-foot-long, 87-foot-wide concrete and steel wharf. It had three parallel railroad tracks and would have enabled the simultaneous loading of several ammunition ships from rail cars and trucks.

Elsewhere aboard the base, the Army built 47 miles of railroad tracks. Spurs off the main line ran into temporary storage areas that were protected by earthen barricades. These mounds of dirt, still prominent features in many areas of the base, were designed to localize damage in case of explosive accidents.

Although the Army base was never activated to serve its primary purpose, it was used twice for other missions. In 1964, as Hurricane Dora hammered the area, nearly 100 area residents were sheltered aboard base. Also, during the Cuban Missile Crisis, an Army Transportation Battalion of 1,100 personnel and 70 small boats took up position at Kings Bay.

The Navy Years

The chain of events that led to today's combination of high-tempo submarine operations at Kings Bay and the complex construction project that has reshaped the face of thousands of acres of land began in 1975. At that time, treaty negotiations between Spain and the United States were in progress. A proposed change to our base agreement with Spain was the withdrawal of the fleet ballistic-missile submarine squadron, Submarine Squadron 16, from its operational base at Rota, Spain. Anticipating that this would take place, the Chief of Naval Operations ordered studies to select a new refit site on the East Coast.

In January 1976, a draft treaty between Spain and the U.S. was initiated by the negotiators; it called for withdrawal of the squadron from Rota by July 1979. The treaty was ratified by the U.S. Congress in June 1976.

A site-selection steering group evaluated more than 60 sites along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts. By summer of 1976, the number of sites was narrowed to five: Narragansett Bay, R.I.; Cheatham Annex, Va.; Charleston, S.C.; Kings Bay, Ga.; and Mosquito Lagoon, Fla.

A comprehensive study then evaluated each site against a number of criteria, including: costs, ability to meet required schedule, land availability to meet explosive safety requirements, operational capabilities and logistics consideration, environmental impact and growth potential for future requirements.

After careful review, Kings Bay was selected.

The first Navy personnel arrived in the Kings Bay area in January 1978 and started preparations for the orderly transfer of property from the Army to the Navy. The actual transfer took place on July 1, 1978.

Preparations for the arrival of the submarine squadron went forward with haste throughout the remainder of 1978 and into 1979. Commander Submarine Squadron 16 greeted the submarine tender USS Simon Lake (AS-33), when it arrived at Kings Bay on July 2, 1979. Four days later, USS James Monroe (SSBN



622) entered Kings Bay and moored alongside Simon Lake's starboard side to begin a routine refit in preparation for another deterrent patrol. Kings Bay has been an operating submarine base since that day.

In May 1980, the decision was made to make Kings Bay the East Coast home port for the next generation of fleet ballistic missile submarines - the Ohio-class or Trident SSBNs. The Trident-basing decision touched off a large building project that lasted throughout the decade. The building project included the construction of three major commands: Trident Training Facility (TTF), Trident Refit Facility (TRF), and Strategic Weapons Facility, Atlantic (SWFLANT).


On January 15, 1989, the first Trident submarine, USS Tennessee

(SSBN 734), arrived at Kings Bay. It was followed by USS Pennsylvania (SSBN 735) later that same year. USS West Virginia (SSBN 736) was commissioned at Kings Bay in October 1990 and was followed by USS Kentucky's (SSBN 737) arrival in July 1991; USS Maryland (SSBN 738), June 1992; USS Nebraska (SSBN 739), July 1993; USS Rhode Island (SSBN 740), July 1994; USS Maine (SSBN 741), August 1995, and USS Wyoming (SSBN 742) in July 1996. The commissioning of USS Louisiana (SSBN 743) in September 1997 gave Kings Bay 10 Trident submarines.

The enormous effort put forth by all the commands at Kings Bay reached fruition in late March 1990, when the Trident II (D-5) missile made its first deterrent patrol on board Tennessee.

The drawdown of military forces in recent years has had an affect on Kings Bay. Submarine Squadron 16 and USS Canopus (AS 34) were both decommissioned in 1994. In addition, a recent Nuclear Policy Review recommended the Navy have 14 Ohio-class fleet ballistic-missile submarines in commission by 2005, vice the 18 currently planned. All of these would carry the Trident II (D-5) missile. The decision has not yet been made as to how many submarines will be homeported at Kings Bay and how many will be based at Naval Submarine Base Bangor, Washington. However, USS Pennsylvania (SSBN 735) and USS Kentucky (SSBN 737) have transferred to Bangor, Wash. as their home port.

Getting There is Half the Fun

Interstate 95 is the most popular route to this area, and the base can be reached by taking Exits 1, 3, or 6. Exit 1 takes you down S. Marys Road and ends at the Franklin Gate. From Exit 3, take Georgia State Route 40 east toward St. Marys and turn left onto Kings Bay Road, which will take you to the Stimson Gate. Exit 6 also leads to Kings Bay Road and to the Stimson Gate.

Bus passengers who are traveling on orders should disembark at the Kingsland, Ga., Greyhound terminal on Route 40.

For those who choose to fly, Jacksonville International Airport is approximately 30 miles south of the base off Interstate 95.

Vehicle Registration

Motor vehicles, privately owned and operated on the base by military and civilian personnel or their family members, must be registered at the Stimson Gate Pass and ID office. After hours and during weekend

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hours, personnel may go to the Franklin Gate Pass and ID office. Valid decals from other military activities will be honored for 30 days with PCS orders. After that, a Kings Bay decal must be affixed.

The Stimson Gate Pass and ID office hours are 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. The office is closed weekends and holidays. The Franklin Gate Pass and ID office hours are 5 a.m. to 10 p.m. seven days a week. Military personnel must use the Stimson office when open.

The following minimum requirements must be met in order to be issued a decal:

- 1) Current vehicle registration;
- 2) Possession of valid state driver's license.

Individuals must have written permission in their possession when operating a privately owned vehicle registered on base to another person (with the exception of immediate family members with the same last name).

Motorcycle operators must meet the same minimum requirements as stated above. In addition, motorcyclists must also have proof of attendance of both the classroom training and the road phase of the Motorcycle Defense Driving Course before being issued a base decal. Helmets, footwear, and other protective gear must be worn at all times while operating motorcycles.

Sponsors Program

So you have orders to Kings Bay. What do you do next? NSB Kings Bay has a great program to aid you with all the necessities of your move. The key to your smooth transition is the sponsor.

Once your orders are received, the base administrative department compiles a welcome aboard package to be sent to you and assigns you a sponsor. The sponsor will enclose a personal letter in the package to welcome you and offer help in your needs. They will also contact you to make arrangements



in order to make your transition as trouble-free as possible.

Temporary Lodging

It is advisable to locate temporary lodging in advance. Your sponsor can help you with arrangements in the local establishments.

Hotels

There are several local hotels in the Kings Bay/St. Marys area. Accommodations are usually plentiful year-round. Your sponsor can provide a list of the hotels in the area.

Navy Lodge

The Navy Lodge has a total of 26 rooms. Two of the rooms are configured for handicapped occupants and 13 are designated as nonsmoking rooms. Twenty-four hour phone service is available. Inquiries may be made by calling (800) NAVYINN.

Alternate Lodging

If you prefer alternate lodging, rental cabins and trailer sites are available at Crooked River State Park, located nearby. The MWR Outdoor Recreation Branch has rental trailers for temporary, economical

living, and will tow them to the state park for your convenience. A large commercial campground is located in Kingsland, Ga.

Weather

The climate in Southeast Georgia is generally temperate. Summers are long and warm with an average relative humidity of about 75 percent. Winters, although punctuated with periodic invasions of cool to occasionally cold air from the north, are mild because of the southern latitude and the proximity to the warm Atlantic Ocean waters.

The annual average temperature for the Kings Bay area is 68. June, July and August are the hottest months, with temperatures averaging near 80 degrees. December, January and February are the coolest months, with temperatures near the middle 50s. Temperatures exceed 95 degrees only about ten times a year and night temperatures in summer are usually comfortable, rarely falling below 75 degrees.

The greatest rainfall, mostly in the form of local thunderstorms, occurs during the summer months when a measurable amount can be expected one day in two. Summer thunderstorms usually occur before the noon hour along the beaches, while afternoon thunderstorms are the rule inland.

Reporting Aboard




The First Stop

The first stop for all new personnel reporting aboard should be their appropriate Administrative Department. Both Subbase and Group 10 admin departments are located in building 1063. Personnel checking aboard Group 10 or any of the submarines should report to Group 10 admin. Trident Training Facility and Trident Refit Facility both have their own admin departments. The Admin Department will get you started on the check-in process and will set up an appointment time for you to visit the Personnel Support Detachment.

If you arrive after hours, check in at your command's quarterdeck and have your original orders endorsed. The next working day, report to admin.

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Personnel Support Detachment

Military members should make the Personnel Support Activity Detachment their next step to complete the required documents. Your admin department will schedule an appointment for you to visit PSD.

Located in building 1052, PSD keeps pay and personnel records up to date and processes travel claims. PSD's other services include ID cards, personnel records review, passport applications, retention information, and guidance for check-in procedures. Housing

The Family Housing Office is located in building 180 at the Family Housing Welcome Center across from the Child Development Center.

Housing and Housing Referral

NSB Kings Bay has 665 family housing units. The Family Housing Office is located in building 180 at the Family Housing Welcome Center across from the Child Development Center.

All service members who are transferring to the Kings Bay area, with or without dependents, are directed to contact the Housing Office before making any off-base housing commitments. This housing service maintains lists of currently available apartments, houses, and mobile homes for sale or rent. The service is designed to save effort and expense during the house-hunting stage of your tour. The Rental Partnership Program is now implemented at Kings Bay Family Housing Office. To sign up, please bring in a copy of your current orders and Leave and Earnings Statement.

All service members, except recruits and trainees, who are accompanied by their family members are eligible for family housing. Service members without dependents are eligible for assignments to bachelor quarters.

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BEQ

The Bachelor's Enlisted Quarter consists of 1,138 rooms and can house a total of 1,687 enlisted personnel. Beginning 1 June 2002, Subbase Kings Bay can no longer provide berthing for Geographical Bachelors other than Resident Advisors in order to meet the Navy's Priority Berthing. A waiting list has been established. Exceptions will be reviewed by the BQ Assignment Review Board.

TVQ

The TVQ (Transient Visitors Quarters) now offers temporary lodging for families and has a total of 273 rooms, two of which are handicapped accessible. The TVQ offers free laundry facilities, TV, VCR, Cable TV and a small conference room. Access to a full size kitchen is also available. The TVQ is within walking distance to the Base Club, Galley, NEX, Commissary and Chapel. For current rates, reservations and more information call (912) 673-2001 Ext. 4871/4971.





Educational Opportunities

Local Schools

Kings Bay residents can take advantage of Camden County's public school system (from kindergarten through 12th grade). The county has 11 schools, including one high school, two middle schools, and nine elementary schools.

Higher Education

On base, Navy College Center hosts several colleges which provide on-base classes for those seeking associate's, bachelor's, and master's degrees. The two on-base institutions include Brenau University and Valdosta State University. They are located in Building 1030 with the Navy College office. Coastal Georgia Community College is located three miles from the base on Colrain Road. There are several other colleges within commuting distance in Brunswick, Ga., and Jacksonville, Fla.

As a supplement to Navy College, the Campus Resource Center, which is run by Valdosta State University, offers academic library

services for members of the Kings Bay community. Materials available include reference material, fiction, and Internet access (for patrons 18 years and older).

The Navy College office contains a fully stocked DANTES test center, where tests are scheduled on a regular basis. Counseling is available for other degree programs, such as Service Member's Opportunity Colleges. The Navy College Learning Center is available for test review or college preparation classes.

Naval Ambulatory Care Center

The Naval Ambulatory Care Center is a primary care outpatient facility that provides routine general and pediatric care. The clinic is located at the junction of USS James Madison and USS Henry L. Stimson Avenues.

The Naval Ambulatory Care Center does not have an emergency



room. Medical emergencies are handled at the nearest emergency room.

Patients are seen during normal working hours for acute and chronic problems from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Monday through Friday (except holidays), 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, and 8 a.m. to noon on Sunday and holidays. The clinic is closed on Thanksgiving, Christmas Day and New Year's Day. However, duty section is on call 24 hours a day to refer



Tricare Prime patients and active duty personnel to the appropriate sources of care.

The clinic uses an appointment system for all beneficiaries, including active duty personnel. All appointments are scheduled through the central appointment desk at (912) 673-4215. Patients who have signed up for Tricare Prime are given priority for appointments. All other beneficiaries are seen on a space-available basis.

Since the Naval Ambulatory Care Center is staffed and equipped to handle general medical problems only, patients requiring more specialized care will be referred to other medical treatment facilities. Both military and civilian providers are used in the referral process. Tricare Prime patients must be referred to outside care by their primary care manager. Tricare Standard and Extra patients may seek care utilizing their Tricare benefits.

Branch Dental Clinic

The Branch Dental Clinic Kings Bay is located in building 1028 at the intersection of USS James Madison and USS Henry L. Stimson Avenues.

The dental staff sees all active duty personnel. Personnel with dental emergencies can be seen at anytime. Family members and qualified beneficiaries are required to utilize the United Concordia dental plan. Information is available upon request from the front desk staff.

Services

Child Development Center

The CDC staff is dedicated to the goal of offering quality childcare and making a happy environment for your children.


The full-time program is a developmental program using guidelines set forth by Navy instruction and The National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). The center has been accredited by NAEYC since 1991 and its curriculum places emphasis on all phases of development.

Any military and DOD family member ages six weeks to five years of age is eligible for enrollment to the center. Priority is given to single and/or dual active duty military and active duty military with a working or student spouse. A child is no longer eligible for the program at the end of the summer (August) preceding admission into kindergarten.

The Center serves more than 280 children and is located in buildings 0150, 0152 and 0147. The CDC hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 0630-1730. They are closed weekends and all federal holidays. For more information about the Child Development Center, call (912) 673-3626.

Chaplain Services and Religious Activities

The base chapel is located in building 1049 across from the Navy Exchange. Religious services are held each weekend. These services include Roman Catholic Mass at 5 p.m. on Saturday and 9 a.m. on Sunday, and religious education classes at 10:30 a.m. on Sunday and 6:30 p.m. on Monday during the school year. (Exact times depend on the age of the student.) Protestant worship services are held at 10:30 a.m. every Sunday morning, and Sunday school is held at 9 a.m. during the school year.



Both Catholic and Protestant communities sponsor a Youth Group on alternating Sundays at 5 p.m. Jewish lay-led Shabbat services are held on the third Friday of the month at 8 p.m.

The base chapel currently has three chaplains. Submarine Group 10 has one assigned chaplain.



Defense Commissary Agency (DECA)

The Defense Commissary Agency, located next to McDonald's in the Navy Exchange complex, carries approximately 9,500 grocery items, more than 85 fresh meat items and more than 140 produce items. The commissary prides itself on its wide selection of fresh meat and its tempting array of fresh produce.

The commissary allows disabled shoppers access to the store 30 minutes before its regular opening hours and provides them assistance with their shopping if needed.

Special orders can be called in and will be available when the patron arrives at the commissary. Most meat special orders can be called in 24 hours in advance, but grocery and produce special orders require 72 hours notice, so they can be ordered and received from distributors. Fleet and Family Support Center

The Fleet and Family Support Center offers a variety of social services to military members and their families.

FFSC provides information and referral services, individual and family clinical counseling, life skills workshops, support groups, relocation assistance, transition assistance, employment assistance, retired affairs assistance, financial counseling and education, new parent support services, family advocacy services, victims assistance, deployment support and ombudsman assembly support. Workshops, presentations and general military training sessions are also available for more than 30 subject areas.

Employment Opportunities

There are four main sources of employment at NSB Kings Bay:

1. Civil service positions with Naval Submarine Base and its tenant commands.
2. Non-appropriated fund positions with Morale, Welfare and Recreation (covering clubs and athletic events) and the Navy Exchange.
3. The Base Operating Services Contractor (BOSC) provides base security, firefighting, maintenance of buildings and grounds, and minor construction work.
4. There are several defense contractors on the base. Employment opportunities should be pursued either directly with the company, or with the Georgia Department of Labor in Kingsland. Naval Submarine Base, Trident Refit Facility

and Strategic Weapons Facility Atlantic rely heavily on the skill, expertise and dedication of a civilian work force in a variety of trades.

Current family members who wish to apply for military spouse preference should contact their local DOD or DON civilian personnel office immediately upon receipt of orders to Kings Bay. Upon arrival to Kings Bay, eligible family members should notify the Human Resources Service Center, Southeast (HRSC SE). The local HRO is available to provide the necessary information to contact the appropriate individual at HRSC SE.



Applicants for non-appropriated fund positions, which are open to the public in the MWR department, can submit application to the MWR Personnel Office located in Building 1032. Their number is (912) 673-4583 or 8572.

Those interested in employment with the Navy Exchange can inquire at the Navy Exchange Personnel Office or by calling (912) 673-3958.

The Georgia State Employment Office is located in Saturday Park on Georgia Route 40, between Kingsland and St. Marys. The office's number is (912) 729-5473.

Legal Services

A Navy attorney, two Legalmen and a legal assistant staff the Command Judge Advocate's Office, located in building 1063. This office advises the Naval Submarine Base Commanding Officer on legal matters and provides advice to base

personnel concerning ethics, military justice, commercial solicitation, outside employment, the Freedom of Information Act, Privacy Act and Standards of Conduct issues. The office can be reached at (912) 673-4732.

The Naval Legal Service Branch Office, located in building 1052 South, is staffed by one Navy attorney, two Legalmen and one civilian paralegal. Active duty personnel, retirees and family members can receive assistance in the following areas: notaries on a walk in basis, powers of attorney, wills/estate planning, domestic relations, leases, real estate, non-support/paternity, household goods claims, traffic accident claims, taxation and other routine legal matters by appointment only. Navy Exchange

Uniform Center/Tailoring/Dry Cleaning - The Uniform Center and Tailoring/Dry Cleaning Shop is located in the Main Exchange. The Uniform Center staff can assist you with all your uniform needs. For more information call (912) 673-2001 Ext. 8558.

Navy Lodge - The Navy Lodge (building 0155) is a beautiful 26

unit hotel. Each unit has two beds, a sitting area and a kitchenette. Reservations for all Navy Exchange Lodges are made by calling (800) NAVY INN. Same day reservations can be made directly by calling 882-6868.

Navy Federal Credit Union

The Kings Bay area boasts two full-service Navy Federal Credit Union member service centers. The Kings Bay Member Service Center is located next to the base chapel and is open Monday from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Tuesday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. The St. Marys Member Service Center is located 1.5 miles off base at 560 Charlie Smith Sr. Highway (Spur 40) near the Franklin Gate. It is open Tuesday through Friday from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Civilian and military personnel regularly employed by the Department of Defense who work at or are stationed at Kings Bay, and members of their immediate families, are eligible for membership at NFCU.

NFCU's direct-deposit and savings program services include share and IRA certificates, share savings, and sharechek checking, all of which pay generous dividends. Navy Federal also offers a wide variety of consumer loan products, including vehicle loans, major credit cards and home-improvement loans at competitive rates.

NFCU has five 24-hour automatic teller machines available to members in the local area. The two ATMs located on base are walk-up machines, one located in the Navy Exchange complex and the other located in the front of Navy Federal Credit Union. The other three local ATMs, one of which is a drive-in, are at the St. Marys MSC. These ATMs can be used by anyone whose financial institution is a member of the PLUS System or Interlink.

Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society

The Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society, located in building 1039 at the Clubs of Kings Bay building, provides assistance to Navy and Marine Corps active duty and retired service members.

NMCRS offers many services including financial assistance for temporary hardship, budget counseling, a food locker, gift layettes of infant clothing and other basic items for newborns, referral to other military or community service organizations, a listening post for people with problems, education loan programs for active duty family members and children of retirees, and fleet input to commissioning programs.

Financial assistance, in the form of interest-free loans when the service member can repay, is provided in emergency situations listed below:

- basic living expenses (food, shelter and utilities)
- emergency transportation
- funeral expenses
- emergency automobile repair
- medical/dental expenses (patient's share after TRICARE)
- personal needs when pay record is lost
- individual home disasters

These areas of assistance, while stated in general terms, are subject to various limitations and restrictions. Volunteers primarily staff the Kings Bay office.

The Periscope, Kings Bay's weekly newspaper, is available at various locations throughout the base and the local community. Postal Service


The U.S. Post Office branch is located just inside Stimson Gate in building 1006.

This small but full-service post office provides a full range of postal needs, including international mail service. The post office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. to noon. The base mailroom is located in the same building.

If you do not have a residence prior to transferring, you will need to forward your mail to your next command. For more information regarding the address of your next command, contact the Naval Submarine Base mailroom at (912) 673-2001 Ext. 9633 or (DSN) 573-2001 Ext. 9633. BOQ and BEQ residents do not receive mail at their residences.

American Red Cross

The American Red Cross is an organization dedicated to its mission statement, "Making a difference in people's lives." The Red Cross lives up to its mission daily by providing a



helping hand to those in need. Among those helped are members of the armed forces and their families.

This nonprofit organization is more than 100 years old and has the tradition of being governed by volunteers. Many contributions are given through the Combined Federal Campaign in partnership with United Way campaigns or, where no United Way exists, independent fund campaigns.

The American Red Cross office at Kings Bay is located in the Family Service Center (building 1051). The Red Cross can be reached anytime at (912) 673-3939.

The American Red Cross offers the following services for military members and their families: communications worldwide to verify family emergencies, financial assistance to meet emergency needs, disaster services, volunteer programs, health and safety classes, referral to other agencies for services, and assistance for personal and family problems.

Security Department

The Security Department provides physical security and law enforcement services to NSB Kings Bay and is manned by active duty military, Department of Defense civilians, and contractor security personnel. Subase Security takes pride in being a "community-policing" organization that is dedicated to serving the Subase community.

Serving as caretakers of the community, Subase Security is committed to "proactive" vice "reactive" policing. This commitment is manifested through a wide variety of programs focused on interacting with the community through a highly refined crime prevention program.

Base personnel must register their vehicles within 30 days if they are reporting aboard for permanent

duty, temporarily assigned to Subase for more than 90 days, or if they are civilians employed at Subase. Personnel can register their vehicles at the Stimson Pass and ID Office, which is located next to Stimson Gate. The Franklin Pass and ID office may be used after hours or on weekends. A valid driver's license and vehicle registration are required to obtain a pass or DOD decal.

Possession or transportation of privately owned firearms and/or weapons on base is prohibited, except for registered hunters, special events, etc. Weapons may be kept in family housing if they are registered with Security at the Stimson Pass and ID office. Weapons cannot, however, be kept in BEQ or BOQ rooms.

Security Department headquarters is located in building 2026 on USS Henry Clay Boulevard. For more information about storing and transporting weapons or other security issues, call Subase Security at (912) 673-2145.

Recreation - MWR

Auto Skills Center

The Auto Skills Center provides our military and civilian personnel a quality, value-based program for the repair and maintenance of their vehicles. The Auto Skills Center is a facility where patron self help is fostered and automotive skills are learned. The center includes five indoor and two outdoor/covered bays, and a coin operated car wash with vacuum. Equipment, tools and supplies are

readily available for completing most major and minor automotive repairs. The center also offers a variety of pay services offered by appointment only. These include oil changes, tire rotation and balance, air conditioning system flush and cooling system flush. Auto Skills workers are on hand to provide technical assistance to all patrons.

Kings Bay Pool Complex

Located in the Fitness Complex, the Kings Bay Pool contains a 25-yard by 25-meter heated swimming pool with an exciting 150-foot double water slide. The pool complex also has a 14-foot diving pool, kiddie pool, sand volleyball areas, playground, horseshoe pits, shaded pavilions and vending area. Large and small private parties can be arranged.

The pool offers family nights, entertainment, swimming and music during tropical summer evenings.

In addition to year-round lap swimming during the workweek, recreational swimming, water aerobics and learn-to-swim classes are also offered seasonally at the base pool.



Bowling Center

Rack-N-Roll Lanes, the base's bowling center, is located next to the Fitness Complex and offers 16 lanes featuring state of the art AMF equipment, with "Xtreme Bowling" a laser light show with intelligent lighting and state of the art sound system every Friday and Saturday from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. A pro-shop, lockers, video and amusement game room are also available. Open bowling, leagues and special tournaments are also offered and bowling parties may be arranged upon request. To satisfy refreshment needs, Rack-N-Roll Lanes is home to Noble Roman's Pizza Express and the 11th Frame Bar & Grill.

Clubs Building

The Clubs Building houses a variety of MWR activities including the Madison Street Buffet & Grille, Propellers and the Kings Bay Community Center. The building also houses the Navy/Marine Corps Relief Society offices, which are located next to the

Community Center. Propellers is open to all hands and sponsored guests for special events and entertainment throughout the year.

Madison Street Buffet & Grille

The new dining facility features a cozy, relaxing environment with a variety of menu items ranging from salads to hot sandwiches, a weekday 25-foot lunch buffet, a separate dinner menu and a beverage service.

Community Center

The Community Center is located in the Clubs Building, north entrance, near the Campus Resource

Center. This facility is available for rent by patrons for special occasions. Small to large areas are available, as well as a lounge complete with dance floor. Kitchen privileges are included with rentals, so patrons can prepare their own food and beverages or hire a caterer.

The rental center carries an extensive assortment of tableware, special serving pieces, equipment and party items to be used in the Community Center or anywhere a patron chooses to hold a special event or party.

The Community Center is also home to bingo. Bingo is held three nights per week, a \$5,000 jackpot is offered on Sunday evenings and

Monday and Wednesday are progressive jackpots. Family bingo is also held quarterly, along with special theme nights throughout the year.

Child Development Homes Program

The Child Development Homes Program arranges for military spouses to care for children in Navy Family Housing units and private off-base military or civilian homes. The child-care provider and the home are certified before and after children are enrolled. Children of military and Department of Defense civilians, six weeks to 12 years old, are eligible for this program, but no more than six children are allowed in the home. Children who are waiting for a space at the Child Development Center or in the Youth Center Programs are welcome to use the Child Development Homes as a source to care for their children.

The Child Development Homes office is located next to the Child Development Center. Its mission is to receive and process applications for interested CDH applicants, maintain and lend equipment, perform monthly inspections, certify housing units, and instruct and certify home-care providers for the CDH program.

Trident Lakes Golf Club

Come out and enjoy a round of golf on Kings Bay's beautiful 220 acre, 18-hole golf course designed by



Arthur Hill. From the beginner to the master, every golfer will meet a challenge. Sharpen yours skills on the driving range, the putting or chipping green, and check out the pro shop for specials on bags, clubs, golf balls, hats and other items.

After an enjoyable day on the course, golfers can stop by Putters Snack Bar to savor a variety of food and beverages.

Fitness Complex

The base Fitness Complex includes two NCAA regulation-size basketball/volleyball courts, and

racquetball courts and wallyball courts. The complex also has men's and women's locker rooms that are complete with saunas; a Cardio Theatre, Life Fitness exercise rooms, heated Olympic size pool used year round for physical fitness training, three sand volleyball courts, three lighted ball fields, and running track.

Our fitness programs are at the forefront of interest by both the military and DOD civilian community.

Patrons can check out equipment for tennis, racquetball, basketball, football and softball at the customer service counter. Shirts, shorts, towels

and shoes can also be checked out. The recreation area also includes lighted tennis and basketball courts, softball fields, a football and soccer field, a newly renovated running track, fitness, biking and jogging trails.

All fitness programs are dedicated to the advancement of understanding the relationship between fitness and healthy habits and to providing excellence in leadership to implement the concepts necessary to enhance the physical and emotional well-being of individuals. Sample programs: PRT Enhancement Training, Cardio Kick-boxing, Power Training, "Begin to Spin" Cycling, Yoga, 5K Command Competitions, and "Boot Camp" Fitness.

A comprehensive Intramural Sports program compliments a well-rounded Fitness Agenda. Selected military teams and individuals are eligible to participate in tournaments sponsored by South Atlantic Regional Sports (SARS) and Navy training Camps.

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Information, Tickets and Tours (ITT)

Information, Tickets and Tours is located in the Navy Exchange complex. If your vacation plans include going to an attraction, make sure to check with ITT first. The office provides all authorized military and civilian patrons with information, attraction tickets from Six Flags near Atlanta to Busch Gardens in Tampa, Fla., entertainment and sporting event tickets at discount prices. The ITT office promotes the Armed Forces Vacation Club with significant discounts on vacation destination condominiums, provides access to the Navy-Wide MWR Leisure Travel Program, offering discounts on airlines, hotels, rental cars, and cruise packages. ITT

also has two certified cruise line agents to assist patrons in booking their dream vacations.

Liberty Single Sailor and Marine Program

MWR's Liberty Single Sailor and Marine program is operated through "Oscars Recreation Center," a new "Theme" facility offering 21 free computers with DSL internet access, a 32" plasma TV, an 8MM movie room with a 60" TV and surround sound, 10 Sony Play-station II, pool and air hockey tables, CD juke box, and vending area. The facility is free to all active duty military and their guests 18 years and older. The program provides single military



and geographical bachelors with wholesome, exciting events and activities to enjoy.

MWR Monthly Events

MWR arranges funding and coordinators for a variety of recreational activities that enhance the leisure time of our fleet commands. Monthly events include golf tournaments, 5K runs, bowling tournaments and sand volleyball tournaments. Additionally, a specialized fitness coordinator instructs all command fitness coordinators through the Navy Exercise Leader Certification course.

Non-Appropriated Fund Personnel Office

The MWR Non-Appropriated Fund (NAFI) employee office is located in building 1032, the MWR administrative office. Interested applicants can review job listings and get information regarding employment by MWR.



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Outdoor Adventures

Outdoor Adventures Center has a brand new facility located next to the Auto Skills Center and has an assortment of equipment and recreational areas around the base that are offered at little or no cost to the patrons. A large variety of rental items enhance leisure skill activities for our military and civilian families; such as campers, tents, rods and reels, boats, canoes, and more. Base permits and hunting and fishing licenses are also available.

Picnic areas with tables and grills are located at various sites around Subbase. The Outdoor Branch can make reservations for large groups at these areas.

The newest addition is the Outdoor Adventure program. This program provides outdoor trips and activities for MWR patrons; such as, canoeing, whitewater rafting, camping, horseback riding, deep sea fishing, bass tournaments and more.

Recycling Center

The MWR Recycling Center is actively pursuing a cleaner, safer environment by collecting, sorting and reselling recycled material to available vendors in the area. Collections from base commands and the surrounding community supply a large variety of recycled material, which help lower landfill costs and supply additional recreational funds to the base.

Trophy Shop

The Trophy Shop is located inside the Fitness Complex and offers customized trophies and plaques. Customers can choose from a variety of trophies and plaques for special presentations, including employee awards and sporting events.

Youth Center

The base's varied and flexible youth program serves the recreational

needs of military and civilian family members assigned to Kings Bay. Programs offered at the Youth Center include school-age care (school year and summer), bimonthly skating parties, special events and seasonal programs, a Youth Sports Program, a teen volunteer program including a summer volunteer program and an active partnership with the Boys/Girls Club of America. The school-age care and teen programs require pre-registration.

The Youth Center contains an Arts 'n Crafts Room, multipurpose gymnasium and skating arena, five classrooms, game room, Computer/Media Room, outdoor play areas, snack bar and two lighted Little League ball fields with a concession stand.

Communities



Camden County at a Glance.....

Geographic Location:

Home to NSB Kings Bay, Camden County is located deep in the heart of Southeast Georgia. Camden County, approximately 300 miles from Atlanta, 109 miles from Savannah and 42 miles from Jacksonville, Fla., is surrounded by Charlton, Brantley and Glynn Counties.

Land Area:

As the ninth largest county in the state of Georgia, Camden County covers an area of approximately 659 square miles.

Climate:

With a pleasurable coastal atmosphere, the people of Camden County enjoy a relatively mild climate. The average yearly temperature is 66.8 degrees, with an average temperature of 81.8 degrees in July and 51.1 degrees in January. Rainfall averages about 51.1 inches per year in the county.

Population :

The population in Camden County according to the 2000 Census is 43,664, a major growth since the 1990 census count of 30,167. Due to Camden's strong economy, steady growth is predicted for the future.

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Transportation:

Camden County is easily accessible, as Interstate 95 (north and south), U.S. Highway 17 (north and south) and GA Highway 40 (east and west) all run through the county. Camden County is also home to CSX Transportation, Inc. in Kingsland, as well as to St. Marys Railroad. United Parcel Service and Greyhound Bus Lines also serve the area.

Jacksonville International Airport is the nearest commercial airport serving Camden County. It is located approximately 30 minutes south of Camden County on I-95. The area is also served by the St. Marys Municipal Airport.

Accommodations:

There are seventeen hotels/motels and three Bed & Breakfast Inns located in the Camden County-Kings Bay Area, with over 1,190 rooms.

Camden County has several different meeting spaces available for use by the general public. These spaces include a banquet room with a capacity of 250, a theater with a capacity of 250, classroom space that can hold 150 and a reception hall that accommodates up to 300. Audio-visual equipment

is available for use. The new Camden County High School theater seats 1,275 people.

Government:

The Camden County government consists of five county commissioners who then elect one of their fellow commissioners to serve as chairperson. Camden County consists of three municipalities: Kingsland, St. Marys and Woodbine. Each of these municipalities has a mayor and a council of four to six people.

Law Enforcement:

The cities in Camden County provide law enforcement services for their residents, while the county provides county-wide protection. St. Marys has the largest police force in the county with 29 officers and 29 patrol cars. The Kingsland police force includes 28 officers and 28 patrol cars, while Woodbine employs 6 officers utilizing 6 patrol cars.

Support Services & Public Safety:

Camden County is served by three Class 6 Fire Departments located in St. Marys, Kingsland and Woodbine, with eleven full-time fire

personnel and 84 volunteers. Four Emergency Medical Technician squads serve Camden County and are based in St. Marys, Kingsland and Woodbine.

Health Care:

Camden Medical Center, a 40-bed hospital located in St. Marys, offers 24-hour emergency service and full medical care. St. Marys Convalescent Center in downtown St. Marys provides critical care services for elderly residents in the area. The center operates one catered and assisted living facility in Kingsland and one assisted living facility in St. Marys. In addition, there are 50 physicians, twelve dentists and two local veterinarian offices.

Financial Institutions:

Camden County has seven financial institutions with assets totaling more than \$8 billion. These institutions include Bank of America, Citizens State Bank, Coastal Bank, First National Bank, United Federal Credit Union, Navy Federal Credit Union and Southeastern Bank.

Education:

The Camden County School System consists of fifteen schools. There are nine elementary schools with grades K-5, two middle schools with grades 6-8, one 9th Grade Center, one high school with grades 10-12 and two special-needs schools. One Christian Academy serves grades pre-K through 12. The county library facilities include the Camden County Public Library and the St. Marys Library, as well as Woodbine's Bryan-Lang Historical Library.

Communications:

Two newspapers serve Camden County; The Georgia Times Union and The Tribune & Georgian. WECC-

AM, WOKF-FM and WKBX-FM radio stations provide music, news and local broadcasts to Camden County residents.

Local Communities:

Kingsland is a city rich in history and natural beauty, along with a vibrant business and social environment. Visitors come here by the thousands each year to enjoy the pristine wilderness of Cumberland Island or the Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge, to hunt for bargains on Antique Row in the historical downtown district, or participate in one of our many local festivals.

A great number of visitors and retirees enjoy Kingsland so much that they decide to settle down to take advantage of all of the wonders of the area in a climate that is pleasant year-round. Also, Kingsland offers unparalleled opportunities for any company that requires a quality labor base, easy access to transportation, or a built-in community of potential customers with relatively high disposable incomes.

St. Marys, the nearest community to the base, is nine miles east of I-95. A quaint, serene and friendly river town perched on Buttermilk Bluff, St. Marys has served as the location of an Indian village, colonial settlement and, more recently, a U.S. Naval base. One of the oldest towns in Georgia, it boasts a national historic district and functions as the embarkation point for Cumberland Island. Visitors may want to first buy tickets for their Cumberland Island trip, then spend time in the historic district until it's time to board the ferry.

Park your car and stroll along the city's Chamber of Commerce-sponsored Osborne Street, shaded by giant oak and palm trees. White picket fences surround many of the historic landmarks. Flowered walkways invite you to come rock "for a spell" on one of the many sea-breezed verandas. Gift and antique shops housed in turn-of-the-century buildings offer hours of browsing. Enjoy delicious fresh seafood and other excellent cuisine found in the eateries of St. Marys. Stay for a while in a historic hotel, one of the bed and breakfasts or locally owned family



hotels. From most of the accommodations, you can walk to the pedestrian ferry for a 45-minute boat ride to Cumberland Island National Seashore, where wild horses, white sandy beaches and natural, unspoiled habitat will greet you.

Woodbine, the county seat, is the fourth city in the county to be selected for that honor. Chosen in 1923 to be the seat of county government, it boasts a courthouse completed in 1928. It continues to house the five-member board of County Commissioners, the county courts and attendant offices, as well as the County Sheriff. This hub of the county government is situated along the banks of the Satilla River, some 18 miles from the base.

Jacksonville, about one hour's drive to the south of Kings Bay, is the largest city in land area in the entire U.S. and has a population of more than 800,000. The city has a variety of cultures and activities. The international airport, located just off Interstate 95 about halfway between the city and the base, is served by most of the major airlines. The Greyhound-Trailways Bus Company also serves the city. Jacksonville, Fla. is the commercial, financial, cultural, medical and urban heart of Northeast Florida and Southeast Georgia.

Situated in the Northeast corner of Florida, Jacksonville is home to three U.S. Navy bases - Naval Air Station, Jacksonville; Naval Station and Naval Air Facility, Mayport. These

bases together constitute the second largest Naval complex on the East Coast.

The St. Johns River, which flows through the heart of downtown Jacksonville and into the Atlantic Ocean, makes the city one of the nation's busiest deep water ports and distribution hubs. The area includes over 35 miles of sandy white beaches, more than 55 world-class golf courses, including the Stadium Course at Sawgrass, home of the legendary 17th hole, beautiful state parks, and luxurious spas and resorts. With a mild year-round climate, this city boasts a wealth of leisure activities and attractions for everyone to enjoy including golf, tennis, boating, deep-sea fishing, kayaking, horseback riding, shopping and much more. Within a short drive from downtown Jacksonville you can visit the historical sights of St. Augustine, the posh island community of Amelia Island and the ecologically beautiful Jekyll Island. For this coming year, sports fans are looking forward to Super Bowl XXXIX, which will be hosted at the Jacksonville's state-of-the-art ALLTEL Stadium, home of the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Brunswick & Golden Isles is less than one hour's drive to the north of the base and is a busy industrial center and port city. It is the gateway to the Golden Isles of Georgia (Jekyll, St. Simons and Sea Islands) and has spectacular views over the marches of Glynn County. Lanier's Oak overlooks the marshes just north of Brunswick. Sidney Lanier supposedly was inspired to write many poems on Coastal Georgia while sitting under this tree. Brunswick is also the home of the Federal Law Enforcement Training Facility Center (FLETC), which occupies the former site of Glynco Naval Air Station.

Savannah, Georgia's oldest city, is located about two hours north of Kings Bay. Much of the colonial charm of the area is preserved in the splendid architectural restorations throughout the city. Cobblestone streets wind in and out of the picturesque squares. A number of famous seafood restaurants in Savannah remind the visitor of the city's proximity to the ocean. The historic waterfront district has been restored and now is a four-mile concourse of museums, boutiques, restaurants and nightspots that echo old world charm along the Savannah River.

Fernandina Beach (Amelia Island, Fla.) is located about 35 minutes southeast of the base, on the northern tip of Amelia Island in Florida. Called the "Isle of Eight Flags," Amelia has been governed variously by France, Spain, Great Britain, Mexico, Florida, independent patriots, the Confederacy and the United States.

Centre Street in Fernandina Beach is a 30-block historic district listed in the National Register of Historic Places. A great deal of restoration has taken place, making the street a reminder of the late 19th century Victoriana. Ocean Park and the 13-mile long beach at Fernandina provide unlimited swimming, surfing and sunbathing. The State Park at Ft. Clinch offers a good place for camping, beach-combing and general outdoor recreation.

Fernandina Beach's docks are the sites where the first off-shore trawlers sailed out early in this century to begin a multi-million dollar shrimping industry, an occasion which is celebrated each year on the first weekend in May with the Isle of Eight Flags Shrimp Festival. The celebration includes shrimp boat races, pirates landing, sidewalk arts and crafts and plenty of seafood.

Entertainment & Lifestyles:

Camden County residents enjoy participating in the numerous leisure activities provided by the County's Recreation Center leisure services, which includes nine parks. Other popular pastimes include golfing, fishing, boating, camping, roller-skating and the theatre. The three local golf courses also offer additional activities and events.

Osprey Cove is a gated club community that offers a championship golf course, which has received much praise and recognition from some of the foremost golf and sports publications, including *Golf Digest* and *Sports Illustrated*. Minutes away from St. Marys; call for more information (800) 352-5575.

Camden County Historical Society (CCHS) is located on Camden's eastern border with Collingswood, the three-building complex is one of the area's largest public history facilities. CCHS is dedicated to preserving,



celebrating and educating the public about the county's richly diverse history.

Saint Marys Submarine Museum presents a fascinating walk through the history of submarines and the men who operated them. The museum is a great place to learn about the "Silent Service." A wide variety of submarine artifacts, memorabilia and information are available for viewing, and you can checkout the beautiful St. Marys waterfront through a real periscope. The museum is a non-profit organization. Located on Saint Marys St., across from the scenic Saint Marys Waterfront between Trolley's and the historic Riverview Hotel. For more information, call (912) 882-ASUB.

Oak Grove Cemetery has graves dating back to 1801, almost making it a "Who's who" of history in Camden County. Located in downtown Saint Marys, early settlers, victims of Yellow Fever, Acadians and at least one brave soldier from every war (except the Persian Gulf) have been

laid to rest here. Established in 1788, it is the largest of many old cemeteries in Camden County.

Pomona Hall began as a small, modest, wood-framed house in 1718. By 1788, Pomona Hall evolved into a luxurious mansion after becoming home to Marmaduke Cooper, one of the area's most prosperous businessmen. It has been declared "the finest example of a Georgian Style plantation house in New Jersey." Today, restored to how it would have looked in its heyday just after the American Revolution, the home allows visitors to experience a vivid

sense of daily life in the eighteenth century.

McIntosh Sugar Works (1825) was originally a successful family enterprise; however, it was later used as a starch factory during the Civil War.

Only a few ruins remain today but the story is another intriguing part of Camden County's rich history. Located on Charlie Smith Sr. Hwy (previously known as Spur 40), just 100 hundred yards from the main gate of U.S. Naval Submarine Base, Kings Bay.

Crooked River State Park - 500 acres located on the south bank of the Crooked River. The park offers a

wide range of excellent facilities including a boat launch ramp, 60 tent spaces, trailer & RV sites, an Olympic size pool and bathhouse, 11 cottages, five large picnic shelters and more. Call (912) 882-5256 for more information.

Cumberland Island National Seashore is the largest and southernmost barrier island in Georgia offering guests over 17 miles of secluded white, sandy beaches. Visit the Greyfield Inn, built in 1901 for the Carnegie family. Converted in the 1960s to an inn, it retains the turn-of-the-century furnishings. A short ferry ride from Saint Marys transports you to this unspoiled National Seashore. Walk along pristine white sand beaches or inland through live oak and palmetto forests. Deer, mink, turkey, wild horses and more roam freely throughout the area. Overnight camping, no-license fishing, hiking, swimming are some available activities. Call for reservations well in advance: (912) 882-4335.

Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge, "The Land of the Trembling Earth," is a scenic 45-minute drive from Saint Marys. Covering nearly 500,000 acres, the swamp offers a rare glimpse into pre-historic times. Walk through an authentic pioneer settlement from the 1800s. Interpretive exhibits, lectures, wildlife shows, boat tours, canoe rentals, wilderness walkways and much more.

Annual Labor Day Catfish Festival is a three-day weekend event sponsored by the Kingsland Convention & Visitors Bureau. Held on the historic streets of downtown Kingsland, Georgia, it features live music by some of the top recording artists, a community parade, races and of course, mouth watering, southern-fried catfish cuisine.



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
